On December 23, 2022, Winter Storm Elliott delivered a windy one-two punch that left 30,000 NHEC members without power. It was one of the most damaging storms in NHEC history.

When the wind stopped, the work started. For the next four days, a growing team of NHEC and contractor line crews, joined by electric cooperative crews from as far away as Virginia, battled sub-zero wind chills in an around-the-clock effort to get power restored. 

Winter Storm Elliott demonstrated (once again) the value of owning a generator. While generators can help keep you comfortable during extended power outages, they can also be a safety hazard if used improperly. Following manufacturers' instructions is the first step toward safe generator use. It's also important to keep your generator dry and to only use it outdoors, away from doors, windows, and vents that could bring carbon monoxide inside. And to avoid "backfeeding," never connect a generator to your home's electrical system without installing a transfer switch.

What does backfeeding mean? Why is it dangerous? And how do you avoid it? Backfeeding can occur when a generator is tied directly to your home's electrical panel without a transfer switch. It may sound innocent enough, but this practice is quite dangerous, as power travels back through utility lines, re-energizing them. This can result in death or injury to you, your family members, or the line crews working outside to restore your power.

Never plug a generator into your home's wiring or directly to the circuit breaker panel. **The best way to avoid backfeed is by installing a transfer switch.** A transfer switch ensures your household wiring can't be connected to the power grid and the generator at the same time, eliminating the possibility of backfeed and keeping everyone safe!

Rate Relief...At Last!

Energy prices are coming down and NHEC is passing along the savings to members!

Effective with bills rendered on or after February 1, 2023, a reduction in the Co-op Power Charge and the Regional Access Charge will result in a **10.5% total bill decrease** for typical residential members. That's a savings of about \$15 per month.

The reduction in the Co-op Power Charge and the Regional Access Charge rates reflect an easing of energy prices in the region, which is welcome news for NHEC members after a period of escalating energy costs. The Co-op Power rate and the Regional Access Charge are adjusted twice a year to reflect the actual cost of power that NHEC purchases for use by its members. NHEC does not mark up the rate it charges for power, nor does it profit from the sale of electricity.



Effective this month, the Co-op Power rate decreases from 16.98 cents per kWh to 13.78 cents per kWh. It's one of the lowest power supply rates in New England!
