NHEC to Return \$2 Million in Capital Credit Payments

The NHEC Board of Directors has approved the return of over \$2 million in capital credit payments to members and former members.

The 2023 capital credit retirement will result in the payment of all remaining capital credits from the years 1984, all of 1985, and part of 1986. Approximately 10,000 current members who had service with NHEC during that time will receive a credit on their July 2023 bills. Former members who no longer take service from NHEC will receive checks for their patronage. This is the third consecutive year NHEC will be returning capital credits to its current and former members.

The Cooperative Difference

NHEC is a nonprofit electric cooperative, which means it is owned by the people and businesses it serves. When NHEC takes in more revenue than it spends in a given year, the cooperative builds equity. Unlike investorowned utilities, however, nonprofit cooperatives return this equity back to the member-owners who created it.

TICKS CAN MAKE YOU SICK New Hampshire Tick Safety



We love getting outside to enjoy spring activities, but unfortunately, so do ticks. New Hampshire is home to black-legged ticks, a.k.a. deer ticks, which can transmit some pretty serious diseases.

Lyme disease is the biggest threat, but anaplasmosis, babesiosis, B. miyamotoi, and Powassan virus are also transmitted by these tiny arachnids.

Ticks can be tough to spot because they are so small, but their bites pack a big punch. Listed here are some tips from NHEC's safety manager, Dustin Ryan, for keeping your family tick-bite-free while playing outside.

Don't let a fear of ticks stop you from enjoying the outdoors; just stay tick aware — together, we can prevent tick-borne illness in our community.

TICK SAFETY TIPS

- Wear light-colored clothing so that you can see ticks.
- Wear long sleeve shirts and pants tucked into socks or boots.
- Apply tick repellent on exposed skin, clothes, and boots.
- Stay on designated trails.
- Check your entire family for ticks every few hours.
- If you find one, remove it asap.
- Check for ticks in hair, thighs, groin, and armpits.
- Use a slotted spoon to remove embedded ticks, pull up & pop out.
- O NOT use kerosene, Vaseline, or other folk remedies.
- Watch for symptoms of tick-borne illnesses, which might include fever, chills, muscle aches, body aches, and/or a target-shaped rash. Seek medical attention immediately if you notice any of these symptoms.

This summer NHEC field employees will all be equipped with Tick Kits with slotted spoons, lint rollers, tick ID cards, alcohol wipes, and baggies to save ticks that are embedded and removed for research.
