### **2025 Annual Meeting**

The 86th Annual Meeting of Members brought a little sunshine to a rainy day at the Owl's Nest Resort in Thornton where more than 100 members and guests gathered to renew acquaintances and learn about the Co-op's accomplishments in 2024.

At the business portion of the meeting, Board Chair Bill Darcy highlighted the benefits to all NHEC members of the efforts of the Co-op's subsidiary, NH Broadband, which built more than 1,100 miles of fiber optic internet lines in 2024. NH Broadband's growing network now offers fiber internet service to more than 35,000 residents of New Hampshire.

Interim President & CEO Michael Jennings reviewed the Co-op's investments in 2024 to improve service reliability, including the replacement of two substations, the relocation of three miles of main circuit lines in Andover, and the continued growth of automation technology on the Co-op's electrical system.

Members who attended enjoyed access to the Owl's Nest resort, a reception prior to the meeting, a live band, and a chance to win raffle prizes.

## Caswell: Co-op Has Delivered on Broadband



As New Hampshire approaches 100% broadband coverage, Taylor Caswell, the Commissioner of the NH Department of Business and Economic Affairs (BEA), told the Annual Meeting gathering that the Co-op has delivered "what we hoped we'd see."

"Here is a great story of a state that has taken a very basic approach – how many people can we get signed up for the least amount of money in the fastest amount of time, and the electric cooperative has delivered that for us." Caswell said.
